



Edationship failures are by far the number one root cause of injury or death in foster care. They for avoid initiately the inherent problems of caring for kids who have bee traumatized by abandrament, asglet an abuse. There are an estimated twelve million former fester kids in the United States alone. Many successful survivors of abuse have created good lives for themseves, but most of them don't speak of their shildhood experiences. They had to live hrough it, and arrn't interested in dredging it up and reliving it by talking about it.

interested in dredging it up and reliving it by talking about it. There are myriad miscanceptions about foster kids and foster care. Some people assume that foster kids are bad. They don't uncerstand that the kids in ioster care are there because they're been mistrated, conventions in unthinkable ways. Some people assume that foster parents are "in it for the money." What hey clearly con't understand is that there isn't erough money on Earth to cempenete good foster families for the sacrifices and hard work of bying a wounded child in ow holeness. Some people shok experinected child how holeness Some people who experinection and the stand are too broken to be fixed. "Another inaccurate assumption. The truth is that many people who experinced childhood abuse are stronger, more reasitent, more resourcehal, more coungecous, and more determined to livit good lives than the average person. According to Dr. Lawrence Cahour, UNC University Psychology Prefessor, and author of Post Traumatic forowth in Chilard Pratice, it is possible to be stronger following trauma. Ves., I aid, "PTSG," NOT PTSD.

TV reporters case the melancholy masis and preduce heart-vrenching segments on the occasional benui end of the reage. It is of a faster child, and secondy, the media has covered the sad fact that some faster kids find themselves trapped in the life of trafficking.

Despte this nearly overwhelming negativity, the turth is that there are myrial inspiring stories of people who have overcome remencour pain and adversify to live good lives. Additionally, there are many wonderful people who have dedicated heir lives and careers to helping victims of abus overcome their pairful experiences. Sadly, these good news isories ravely capture the attention of rational media. To courter this, the Successful Survivors Foundation, a non profit organization founded to help victims of duus succeed not despits, bub because of what they've been through, set out to findsoms of the inspiring stories of overcomers and hose who help others ververow. They stablished an annual award for overcomers in the categories of foster alamm, foster paents, teachers, social workers, and visionniers. They sught nomirations, evaluated the submissions, and found thenselves with the very difficult used of elocong with mers in each eageopt.

Every nomination submission received told the story of abandymment, neglect, and abuse followed by the emerging of the strong, resilient, courgecos person whe agrew from the ables of pint. The stories that follow are the highlights of the winners of the 2015 Successful Survivers Foundation Oversemer Awards in the exteporties of Foster Ahm, Educator Foster Parent, and Social Worker.


